GLOBALVOTE (www.theglobalvote.org) is an innovative, Internet-based democratic tool that enhances democracy through shadow voting and polling systems. GlobalVote will empower the world's Internet users by registering their opinions and recording their votes on the world's most pressing issues, including resolutions under consideration at the UN, the World Bank, and the World Trade Organization. GlobalVote takes advantage of the global link provided by the Internet, establishing a fair and proper voting system for assessing global public opinion.

Over the past decade, the Internet has created a world that communicates effortlessly and regularly works together to effect positive change. While both the private and public sectors have largely been transformed by this technology, the power structures of the world's most influential decision-making organizations have not yet embraced these developments. The Internet could potentially allow for fairer representation for the citizens of the 192 member states of the UN, but it and the world's other major International Organizations have been operating more or less the same since the end of the Second World War.

While International Organizations have ceased to change over the past sixty years, national governments the world over continue to conduct opaque, often rigged elections under the guise of democracy. In the Middle East, Africa, Asia, and Latin America, citizens continue to protest and fight their respective governments for fairer, more transparent voting processes.

GlobalVote believes that people all over the world should have more of a say in decisions that directly or indirectly affect them. The Internet has now developed to such an extent—allowing for greater usability, connectivity, and participation thanks to the growth of wireless communication and the popularity social networking sites—**that today, innovative democratic systems online can seriously challenge and contend with many of the world's broken governments. With your participation, this exciting future for democracy can be realized.**

How does GlobalVote work?

GlobalVote consists of a combination of delegated representation and a general (popular) vote. There will be 192 national virtual parliaments—one for each of the 192 member states of the UN— with 100 representatives (delegates). The first three parliament seats for each country will be designated as board-member seats and will be representatives from universities, non-governmental organizations, think-tanks, and the media. The remaining 97 parliament members will be chosen on a representational basis according to age, gender, marital status, education, and religion, and will be expected to have an understanding of global issues. Participants beyond the first 100 in each country will gain 'general voter' status and will represent their parliaments in the global popular vote, which consists of the opinions of all GlobalVote members.

We aim to educate and inform our voting community, especially those users who otherwise might not have access to information regarding global politics and global decision-making in an organized, systematic way. Uninformed users will become active, informed voters by utilizing our website and the information we provide, which includes links to articles from the world's most respected and reliable media outlets, as well as local coverage respective to each vote.

Vote On Global Issues and Vote Often

GlobalVote aims to collect the opinions of the international online community and to educate users on the world's most pressing global issues. By disseminating voting results to International Organizations, universities, the media, non-governmental organizations and national governments, GlobalVote will mobilize this community and achieve the changes that the world has clearly spoken for.

We plan to focus our attention on the world's most pressing international issues, such as nuclear disarmament, climate change, and the world's responsibility to take action in crisis situations. Above all, we will focus on the most current and pressing issues facing the world, week to week.

Examples of recent votes include:

- 🗳️ Should the United Nations impose sanctions blocking the exporting and importing of nuclear materials and equipment to Iran?
- 🗳️ Should a post-Kyoto agreement be more ambitious in target setting than the current one?
- 🗳️ Should protests in Kenya over the December 2007 presidential election continue?
